LABOUR MOVEMENT MUST RESIST RACIST HATE!

Members of the Industrial Workers of the World were on the ground in Drogheda in January to confront Hermann Kelly and his racist goon squad in the Irish "Freedom" Party.

A broad coalition of leftists, trade unionists and ordinary people who simply don't care for bigots massively outnumbered the IFP and its supporters.

Kelly's attempt at a speech was disrupted, drowned out and rendered inaudible. The people of Drogheda made it clear that the racism and homophobia of the IFP will not be tolerated.

A spokesperson for the IWW who attend the counter protests said that "The IWW is committed to anti-racism and anti-fascism; it always has been and always will be. We welcome all nationalities, cultures, genders, and creeds.

"The working class is strongest when we stand together. We will not allow these bigots with connections to the recent coup attempt in Germany to divide us.

In the workplace or on the streets we will never tolerate bigots; they will be confronted and they will be stopped. We go where they go!"




On The Streets: Drogheda counter protests against racist hate


IWW REGIONAL ELECTIONS

BLOODY SUNDAY SOLIDARITY

Thousands marched through the streets of Derry, Ireland on Sunday marking the annual Bloody Sunday massacre. A tragedy which took place in the Bogside area of the city 51 years ago this year.

A horrific event which has not just impacted upon the lives of those murdered or injured a day, but also upon the population of Derry itself. Undoubtedly, Sunday 30th January 1972, is a date forever etched on the minds and lives of those from the city.

A day when the notorious first battalion of the British Parachute Regiment were let loose by their masters and the British establishment on an outlawed, unarmed civil rights demonstration in Derry. A deliberate action by the state that resulted in thirteen people murdered and seventeen wounded, another was to die as a result of their wounds. The majority of whom were members of the local trade union movement.





The legacy of that faithful day was prominent in the minds of those in attendance as the March for Justice set off in the Creggan area with a leading banner that read 'an injustice to one is an injustice to all'. The march, as it always has done, travelled the same route as the original Civil Rights march of 1972. Attended by a series of community and social justice groups, along with trade unions, political organisations and the non-aligned members of the public.

Expressing their support and solidarity, local members of the Industrial Workers of the World in Derry were joined by fellow workers from across different parts of country as well as England.

They took their place behind the family of miscarriage of justice prisoner and fellow worker, whose banner demanded the immediate release of both John Paul Wootton and Brendan McConville, together known as the Craigavon Two.


BULLDOZER #2 OUT NOW!
